The Medical Director was required to submit monthly and yearly reports summarizing the operations of the Cresson Sanatorium. These reports were submitted to the Bureau of Tuberculosis Control in Harrisburg, Pa. Copies of five of these reports have been obtained. The reports have two basis sections: (1) a written section describing the activities of the staff and employees and (2) tables of statistical data concerning patient care and hospital operations. These reports are like time capsules giving us a glimpse into the people and activities at the sanatorium. As luck would have it, several of these reports were written in 1955 and 1956, the two years that I was a patient in the sanatorium and so I was there to witness some of these events

The following is a report of operation of Gresson Sanatorium for the month of December, 1955:

APPOINTMENTS AND RESIGNATIONS

There were no appointments or resignations among the key personnel during the month of December.

MEETINGS

Lecture on hypertension at Veterans Administration Hospital, Altoona, by Doctor Garfield C. Duncan of Philadelphia. Attended by Doctor Grace L. Moyer and Doctor Anna Kreicbergs.

A lecture on pulmonary function at Veterans Administration Hospital, Altoona, in November was attended by the Medical Director and staff physicians, O'Leary, Fawber, Jahnig and Boustani. We failed to mention this meeting in our November report.

ADULT EDUCATION

Through an oversight, we failed to mention in our October and November reports, the postgraduate work taken by two of our staff physicians.

During the month of October, Doctor John M. Stanley and Doctor Richard P. Jahnig attended four Sunday afternoon sessions on pulmonary diseases, held in Pittsburgh. These sessions were sponsored by the Western Pennsylvania Chapter of the American College of Chest Physicians.

In November, the same two physicians were enrolled in a postgraduate course in diseases of the chest, held at the Park Sheraton Hotel, New York City.

These courses were sponsored by the Council on Postgraduate Medical Education of the American College of Chest Physicians with the cooperation of the New York State Chapter of the College and the members of the Staffs of the Medical Schools and Hospitals of New York City.

CARE OF PATIENTS

ment and the service to the patient, was inspected during the month by the Dietitian, the Director of Nurses and the Medical Director. Any measures that were deemed necessary were corrected.

Christmas Holiday Activities for Patients

Staff to make the holiday season pleasant for the patients who could not return to their homes.

Patients who were physically able assisted the nurses, aides and orderlies in decorating the hospital wards and the Christmas trees. Much artistic ability was displayed in painting Christmas scenes on the windows.

A number of County Tuberculosis and Health Societies sent Christmas gifts for patients from their particular counties.

Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliaries, American Legion Auxiliaries, Gold Star Mothers, and the Pennsylvania State American Legion sent gifts to patients who are veterans.

The Coca Cola Bottling Company of Altoona and the McAllister Bottling Company of Johnstown sent in enough Coca Cola and Seven-up so that each patient and employe received one bottle of the soft drink.

Permission was granted to have the radio broadcasts continue until ten p.m. for the hospital ward patients during the Christmas Holidays.

One of the highlights of Christmas treats for all patients is the annual distribution of Christmas Stockings sent to them by the Pennsylvania Council of Protestant Church Women. The Stockings are filled with wrapped candy, nuts, soap, tooth brushes and paste,

pocket combs, note pads, postage stamps and various other small articles. Several persons dressed as "Santa Claus" distributed them on the afternoon of December twenty-first.

Miss Nellie Keever, beautician from Gallitzin, spent a day at the sanatorium shortly before Christmas. She gave a number of the women patients a hair styling and wave set as a Christmas gift.

The Community Store Manager, Mrs. Inez Wilson, made up a number of Christmas packages for men and women patients who, it was believed, would not receive gifts from relatives or friends. These gift packages numbered approximately sixty, and were paid for from the profits of the Community Store.

Two Brownie groups of Girl Scouts from Cresson and Gallitzin also sent in a number of very nice Christmas packages for some of the indigent patients.

INCIDENTAL FEATURES

A new Protestant chaplain was appointed to Gresson Sanatorium on December eleventh by the Pennsylvania Council of Churches. The Reverend William J. Jackson, formerly chaplain at the Pilgrim State Hospital, Long Island, New York, preached his first sermon at the sanatorium Grace Chapel on December eleventh.

Born in Flint, Michigan, Chaplain Jackson received his education at Seattle Pacific College, New York Biblical Seminary and Princton Theological Seminary.

Prior to receiving special training in institutional clinical pastoral work at St. Luke's Hospital, New York City, and the federal detention headquarters in New York, Chaplain Jackson served parishes in Prince Albert, Canada, Plainfield, New Jersey and Naugatuck, Connecticut. He was ordained a minister in the Evangelical Covenant Church (Swedish Luthern).

The new Chaplain, Mrs. Jackson and their four month old daughter reside at 402 Ashcroft Avenue, Cresson.

The Catholic patients and employes have been served faithfully for a number of years by the Reverend Father Walter Byrne. As has been their custom annually,

Father Byrne was presented a monetary gift at Christmas.

Grace Chapel is shared by the Catholics and Protestants, one service following the other on Sunday mornings. Both services are broadcast over the sanatorium radio system to hospital bed patients.

Flowers are provided every Sunday for the pulpits by the sanatorium Community Store. During the Christmas Holidays, six large pots of lovely Poinsettias graced the altar railing. The Poinsettias were also provided by the Community Store.

SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

The Director of the department took an active part on the program of the Rehabilitation Institute held at the sanatorium on December ninth.

This department is making plans to assist patients, who request help, with preparation of their Annual Income Tax Returns.

REHABILITATION DEPARTMENT

The most important item of interest in this department for the month, in addition to routine work, was the very successful clinical demonstration, arranged and coordinated by Richard E. Acciavatti, Director of Rehabilitation Counseling, which was presented at the sanatorium on Friday, December ninth. The demonstration was a part of the first of a series of orientation institutes for Rehabilitation Counselors, sponsored by the Department of Education of the Pennsylvania State University in cooperation 7ith State Vocational Rehabilitation Agencies, and the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The general purpose of the Institute was to provide an intensive two-week period of in-service training for newly employed counselors working for State Rehabilitation Agencies. One day of the two-week period was spent studying general procedures at Cresson Sanatorium, as mentioned above.

Members of the sanatorium staff participating in the program were, Doctor John G. Jones, Senior Tuber-culosis Physician; Eleanor McHail, Head Nursing Supervisor;

Paul E. Jones, Director of Social Service; Virginia Talko, Assistant Nursing Supervisor; Mary Mackereth, Instructor at the Carnegie School located on the grounds; Edna Exline, Occupational Therapy Aide, and Julius Iacurto, Rehabilitation Counselor, State Bureau of Rehabilitation, Altoona.

Twenty-nine Counselors from New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey attended the Institute. The group was attended by a number of the permanent members of the Pennsylvania State University faculty.

The program showed, step by step, what happens in the life of a tuberculosis patient from the time of diagnosis, through all stages leading to his discharge, with medical consent. Through rehabilitation, the patient has new plans for his future when he returns to his home and society. This Institute is the first of a series of five to be held at Cresson Sanatorium. The next one is scheduled for January thirteenth.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY DEPARTMENT

Patients were busy during the early part of the month with pre-Christmas activities. The entire department was closed for the holiday season as many of the patients were at home on leave of absence.

NURSING DEPARTMENT

Members of the nursing staff assisted visiting groups of Foreign Wars and American Legion Auxiliary Members in distributing gifts to patient-veterans during the holiday season.

Staff Education

A moving picture on mental health was shown to the nursing staff.

Two of the Nursing Supervisors, Miss Eleanor McHail and Miss Virginia Talko took part on the program presented at the Institute on Rehabilitation, held at the sanatorium on December ninth. They demonstrated, "The Procedure for Admitting Patients", and "The Orientation of New Patients."

Social Activities

The nurses held their annual Christmas party at C'Halloran Hall on the evening of December twenty-first. A number of the married nurses brought their husbands and children with them. In addition to the nurses, many other staff employes attended the party. The home was beautifully decorated for the occasion. During the early part of the evening, the group gathered in the lounge of the home and sang Christmas Carols, and later in the recreation room, where they were greeted with a brightly blazing fire in the fireplace. Santa Claus soon put in an appearance and distributed gifts. Christmas cookies, candies, punch and coffee were served by Miss Elsie Beyer, Nurses' Home Hostess and her Committee.

Among the guests were, Doctor and Mrs. Deno Thevaos. Doctor Thevaos is Psychology Instructor from the Pennsylvania State University who conducts a weekly class in Psychology at the sanatorium for nurses and a few other students. The doctor was presented with a gift by the psychology class.

Also among the guests was the new Protestant Chaplain, the Reverend William Jackson, who had an opportunity to meet many of the employes for the first time. Mr. Jackson was also presented with a Christmas gift. The party was planned by our Director of Nurses.

ENTERTAINMENT FOR PATIENTS AND EMPLOYES

A group of students from Mount Aloysius Junior College for Women came to the sanatorium on Sunday evening, December eleventh, and sang Christmas Carols on the grounds near the hospital wards.

The highlight of entertainment for ambulant patients during December was their annual Christmas party which was held in the main dining room on evening of December twenty-first. About six o'clock that evening, "The Christmas Story" was broadcast from the dining room to the hospital patients, and this was followed by the singing of Christmas Carols by a group of sanatorium employes and patients. Later in the evening, Al Wickes and his Orchestra entertained the patients with dance music. The orchestra was sent to the sanatorium through the courtesy of the American Federation of Musicians,

Local No. 564. The complete program was broadcast to bed patients. The dining room was gaily decorated for the occasion, which was sponsored by the Cresson Patients' Association. A nice lunch was served by the Dietary Department.

Balance of entertainment for hospital patients consisted of their weekly programs broadcast over the sanatorium public address system, and moving pictures shown in the wards.

There were two orchestra concerts presented in the main auditorium in addition to weekly moving pictures.

MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF PHYSICAL PLANT

All maintenance crews were on routine work throughout the month, with the exception of laborers who cut a large number of Christmas Trees for the hospital wards and dining rooms. This year, the trees were placed in buckets of wet sand and every day or two, a man made rounds and added water to the sand. The trees remained fresh and did not dry out and lose their needles. It is believed that placing them in the wet sand also eliminated a fire hazard.

The electricians trimmed the outside trees with colored lights. They also tested all lights before permitting them to be used in the hospital wards.

The sanatorium presented the town of Cresson with a large Christmas Tree taken from the grounds. It was placed in the Community Center of the town and was decorated with colored lights by the Lions' Club.
