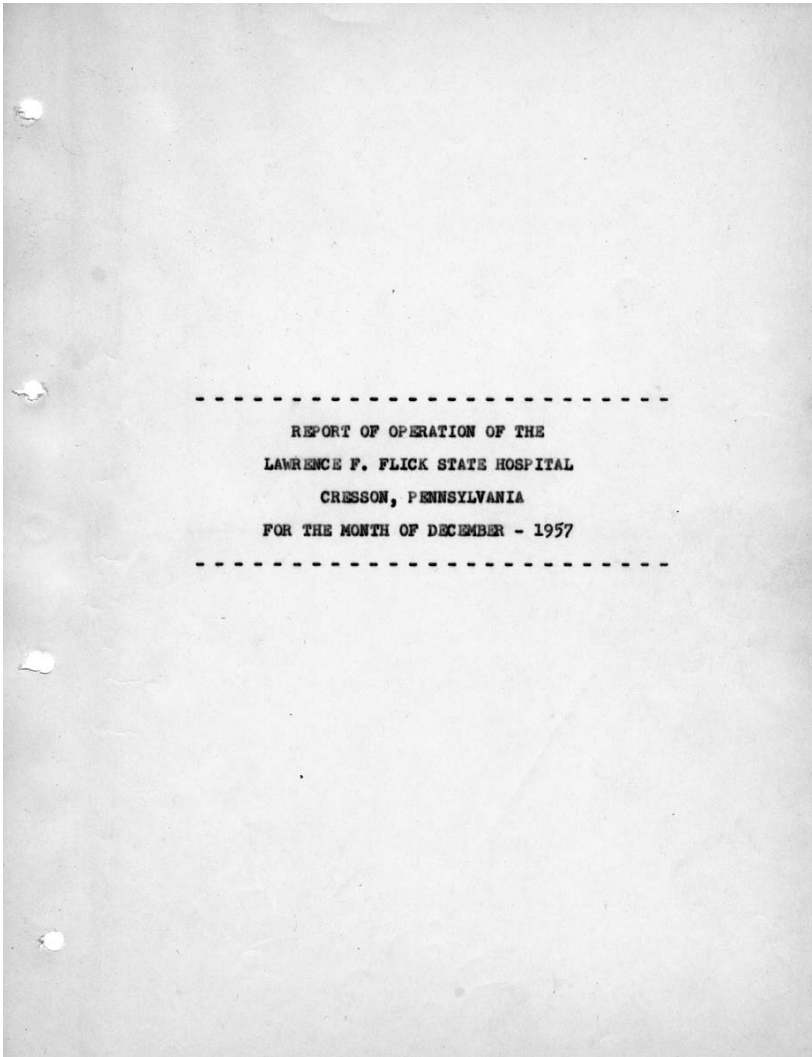


The Medical Director was required to submit monthly and yearly reports summarizing the operations of the Cresson Sanatorium. These reports were submitted to the Bureau of Tuberculosis Control in Harrisburg, Pa. Copies of five of these reports have been obtained. The reports have two basis sections: (1) a written section describing the activities of the staff and employees and (2) tables of statistical data concerning patient care and hospital operations. These reports are like time capsules giving us a glimpse into the people and activities at the sanatorium. As luck would have it, several of these reports were written in 1955 and 1956, the two years that I was a patient in the sanatorium and so I was there to witness some of these events .

The following is a report of operation of the Lawrence F. Flick State Hospital for the month of December, 1957:

APPOINTMENTS

There were no appointments to key positions during the month.

RESIGNATIONS

Charles E. Fawber, M. D., Staff Physician, passed away on December 3, 1957. Doctor Fawber had been on leave of absence due to illness since August, 1956.

William L. Fry, Maintenance Engineer and Consultant in Engineering for the Department of Health, retired on December 31, 1957, after serving the department for a period of forty-four years.

Mrs. Regina E. Bell, Laundry Manager for approximately twenty-six years, retired on December 31, 1957.

Mrs. Roby Van Scoyoc, Housekeeper for the past nine and one-half years, retired on December 31, 1957.

MEETINGS

Meeting of the American College of Chest Physicians, Warwick Hotel, Philadelphia, from December second to the third, inclusive. Attended by the Medical Director and Doctor Thomas F. O'Leary, staff physician. Both doctors served as members of committees for the meeting. The Medical Director also had the honor of being accepted for a Fellowship in the American College of Chest Physicians.

Clinical Meeting of the American Medical Association, held in Philadelphia, from December third to sixth. Attended by the Medical Director and Doctor Robert W. Smith, staff physician.

Meeting of Medical Social Workers from Department of Health Hospitals, held in Harrisburg on December sixth. Attended by Miss Mary E. Smith, Director of Social Service. Doctor M. C. Stayer, Director, Division of Tuberculosis Control, and Doctor Harold E. Coder, Chief, Diagnostic and Clinic Services, addressed the group.

District Six Meeting of the National Employment of the Physically Handicapped Association, held at the Penn Alto Hotel, Altoona, on December fourth. Attended by Mr. Richard E. Acciavatti, Director, Rehabilitation Counseling. Secretary of Labor and Industry, the Honorable William L. Batt, Jr., gave a report as Chairman from the Governor's Committee.

#### CARE OF PATIENTS

Special efforts were made by the Administrative Staff to make the holiday season pleasant for the patients who could not return to their homes. Patients who were eligible were granted a leave of absence.

Patients who were physically able assisted the nurses, aides and orderlies in decorating the hospital wards and trees. Much artistic ability was displayed in painting Christmas scenes on the hospital windows.

Large pine trees on the grounds were decorated with colored electric lights which added much to the holiday spirit. Christmas trees were cut and placed throughout the wards and dining rooms.

Patients and employes enjoyed a very delicious turkey dinner on Christmas day. An Altoona Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary sent in attractive menu covers, and a mimeographed copy of the Christmas Dinner Menu was placed in the folders and given to each patient as a souvenir.

A number of County Tuberculosis and Health Societies sent in Christmas gifts for patients from their particular counties.

The Cresson Women's Club sent a number of lovely gifts to indigent patients.

Various Auxiliaries of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the American Legion, as well as the Pennsylvania State American Legion, remembered patients who are veterans with gifts.

The Pennsylvania Council of Protestant Church Women presented each patient in the hospital with a lovely Christmas Stocking. The stockings were filled with wrapped candy, nuts, soap, tooth brushes and paste, pocket combs, and various other small articles. The presentation was made by "Santa Claus," assisted by Chaplain Reynolds.

#### DIETARY DEPARTMENT

Service to patients in the hospital wards and cafeteria was inspected by the dietitian, the medical director, the director of nurses, and the business manager.

#### INCIDENTAL FEATURES

The Medical Director and Mrs. Weest entertained at a farewell buffet supper on the evening of December nineteenth in honor of Mr. William L. Fry, Maintenance Engineer, Mrs. Regina E. Bell, Laundry Manager, and Mrs. Roby Van Scoyoc, who retired on December thirty-first. The guests of honor were presented with gifts by the heads of departments who attended the party.

#### SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

The Director attended a meeting of Social Workers held in Harrisburg on December sixth.

Activities for the month centered primarily around direct services to the patients.

#### REHABILITATION DEPARTMENT

The Director attended District Six Meeting of the National Employment of the Physically Handicapped Association on December fourth. Mention of this meeting is made in the report under "Meetings."

The second training course in Homemaking was completed on December thirteenth. The course which began

on October twenty-first, was attended by sixteen patients. The attendance remained steady, and the instructor was impressed with the increase of interest and participation.

Appreciation of the course had been expressed at various times by those attending and the Christmas mail has included a note of thanks from one of the trainees who is now at home with her family.

Recognition of the course was made in the Annual Report of the State Bureau of Rehabilitation, citing it as an innovation to meet the previously unmet needs of female tuberculosis patients who return to their former home management responsibilities. The same report acknowledged the participation and planning by the hospital staff, and the School of Home Economics of Pennsylvania State University.

#### OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY DEPARTMENT

Patients were very busy during the early part of the month with pre-Christmas activities. Many various and unique projects were completed by the patients, both at bedside and shop, which they presented to their relatives and friends for Christmas gifts.

The entire department was closed over the holiday season as activities are very slack during this period due to leave of absence of patients.

#### NURSING DEPARTMENT

Members of the Nursing Staff assisted visiting groups of Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion Auxiliary members in distributing gifts, during the holiday season, to patients who are veterans.

#### Social Activities

A very enjoyable Christmas party for the nursing personnel, their families, and other hospital staff, was held in O'Halloran Hall on the evening of December seventeenth. Mrs. Lois Culbert and Mrs. Mary McCurdy served as hostesses, along with the Director of Nurses, Miss Rachel A. Neill.

The guests assembled in the lounge, which was beautifully decorated for the occasion, and listened to the Christmas Story as told by Doctor John G. Jones, one of the staff physicians.

Christmas carols were sung by the group, with Miss Amanda Forsten playing the piano. Mrs. John G. Jones sang a solo.

Following the entertainment, "Santa Claus" presented the children who attended the party with gifts which had been placed under the Christmas tree in the recreation room.

The two hospital chaplains, who were guests at the party, were presented with gifts of money. The presentation was made by the Medical Director.

The refreshments were served by the nurses.

#### ENTERTAINMENT FOR PATIENTS AND EMPLOYEES

The highlight of entertainment for ambulant patients was a Christmas party held in the main dining room on the evening of December nineteenth. Music for dancing was furnished by the American Federation of Musicians. A number of hospital employes attended the party. Refreshments were served to the patients and their guests.

Students from Mount Aloysius Junior College sang Christmas carols on the grounds near the hospital wards on the evening of December thirteenth.

Other entertainment was provided by television programs, and the regular weekly radio programs sponsored by the Patients' Association. In addition to this entertainment for bed patients, moving pictures were shown in the wards.

Ambulant patients and employes enjoyed moving pictures in the main auditorium. The moving picture screen has recently been enlarged so that vista-vision and cinemascope pictures can be shown. The cost of the new screen and necessary changes to the projector were paid from the profits of the Community Store.

#### MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF PHYSICAL PLANT

Project No. 1525 - addition to locker and lavatory facilities for J and K hospital wards, was completed by the end of the month.

It was necessary to have a considerable amount of work done on the refrigeration plant during the month of December.

Electricians decorated several of the large pine trees near the Administration Building and the hospital wards with colored lights during the Christmas season. They also tested electric lights for trees in the wards.

All other maintenance employes were on routine work during the month.

This Department is now without a Maintenance Engineer. Responsibility for various phases of operation of the physical plant has been placed on the foremen, and no difficulty is anticipated. However, it is hoped that a new engineer can be secured before too long.
